














Darwin's Fox Origami Instructions

* Print out the Wildscreen Darwin's fox origami template and cut out to form a square *

	<p>Step 1: Start with a square piece of paper printed-side down (with 'top flip' on the edge furthest from you).</p>		<p>Step 8: Make a fold along the dotted line as shown.</p>
	<p>Step 2: Fold the paper in half diagonally by folding the bottom right corner up to the top left corner.</p>		<p>Step 9: Slowly unfold the left side of the crease you just made. As you unfold notice that at the top there are three points.</p>
	<p>Step 3: Fold paper in half again to make a smaller triangle.</p>		
	<p>Step 4: Crease well and unfold.</p>		<p>Step 10: Fold down the central point to make the fox's head.</p>
	<p>Step 5: Fold the top right corner tip in towards the centre.</p>		<p>Step 11: Decorate your fox by drawing on a face.</p>
	<p>Step 6: Repeat with the bottom left corner to create a square.</p>		<p>Step 12: To finish, make a small fold at the end to create the fox's tail, and to help it stand up.</p>
	<p>Step 7: With the crease facing upwards, fold the square in half, creating a smaller triangle (you need to be able to see the writing).</p>	<p>With thanks to Origami Instructions www.origami-instructions.com</p>
